
Still, as in the past, members of the Foot Patrol are engaged in a wide array of activities that serve our great Shrine and support the greatest philanthropy in the world.

What is a Shriner?

Someone may answer: "Oh yeah, Shriners are those guys who always have those parades with the wild costumes, wearing funny hats like flowerpots and have those big conventions." Another may think of Shrine circuses and Shrine clowns.

"I don't know about that," a passerby may add. "But I do know my little girl was born with club feet and now they are straight, and she can walk like anyone else, thanks to Shriners Hospital for Children."

"She can walk?" questions still another. "I thought the Shriners ran those fantastic burn hospitals. I've read stories about them saving kids with burns on 90 percent of their bodies."

All those people are right. Each has experienced an aspect of the Shrinedom. What they cannot experience, unless they are Shriners, is the camaraderie, deep friendship, good fellowship and great times shared by all Shriners. What they may not know is that all Shriners share a Masonic heritage and adhere to the principles of Freemasonry - Brotherly Love, Relief and Truth.

Thirteen Masons organized the first Shrine Temple in 1872. That first Temple was named Mecca and was in New York City. They knew they needed an appealing theme for their new order, so they chose the Arabic (Near East) theme. The most noticeable symbol of Shrinedom is the distinctive fez that all Shriners wear at official functions.

There are approximately over 400,000 Shriners now. There are 191 Temples and clubs, throughout the United States, Canada, Mexico and the Republic of Panama. There are 22 Shriners Hospital for Children, 18 orthopedic hospitals, three burn hospitals and one hospital that provides orthopedic, burn and spinal cord injury care. These hospitals have cured or substantially helped more than 600,000 children at no cost to parent or child, since the first Shriners Hospital opened in 1922.

Shriners Creed

Shriners believe in God and that He created man to serve His purposes, among which is service to others in His name. We believe that care for the less fortunate, especially children who suffer from burns and crippling diseases, is our institutional calling. We are patriots, each willing to serve his country with fidelity and courage. We cherish independence under law and freedom with responsibility. We honor family. We respect our parents, wives and children. We should instill in our children the tenets of this creed, and the heritage from which it emanates. As individuals we pledge ourselves to integrity, virtue and nobility of character. Our intentions will be honorable, our relations will be trustworthy and our spirits forgiving of each other. As brothers we offer each other fraternal affection and respect. Together we will support each other in adherence to this creed, so that we and our communities will be the better because of our fraternity and its principles.

As Shriners we look beyond ourselves to serve the needs of others, especially children who cannot help themselves. We believe Shriners Hospitals to be the world's greatest philanthropy, and we covenant with each other to support its "temples of mercy" with spirit, time, talent and means.






REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON FINANCE.

To the Potentate, Officers, and Nobles of El-Kahir Temple,
A. A. O. N. M. S.:

We your Committee, to whom was referred that part of the report of the of the Committee on Potentate's address regarding the recommendation made for a change in dues and an increase of the fees of the Order, would respectfully report that we find it impossible to make such an examination of the Records of the Temple as is contemplated in the former report, even if such was necessary. The accounts have been audited annually by the Finance Committee, all the vouchers of the present Recorder are on file and all bear the approval of the Temple, the vouchers of his predecessore are not available, and we do not deem it necessary to have had them at hand for the making of this report.

We do believe that some changes should be made in the conducting of the business of this Temple and we recommend accordingly the following:-

I. That hereafter, no meetings of the Temple for Ceremony be held, nor any arrangements completed for the same, until the number of applications agreed upon to be necessary to pay all the expenses of a meeting, and the checks attached are in the hands of the Local Committee; and that this Temple will not tolerate any deviation from this rule.

II. Owing to the confusion that now frequently arises in the minds of newly created Nobles in regard to the payment in advance of their dues, and the fact that the Noble of a Temple without his fez is as much out of place as a Mason without his apron, we recommend that the Fees shall hereafter include the amount necessary to pay our year's dues and the price of a standard fez, - the amount in all to be \$50.00.

III. In regard to the question of raising the dues, we are not as fully informed as we would like to be; but we do not believe it expedient to make any change at this time, though fully believing that the time is ^{at hand} ~~not far distant~~ when some increase ^{should} ~~have to be made~~; we recommend that the dues be \$2.00 ^{on and after Dec 31, 1900.}

IV. As the amount of business transacted by the Treasurer and Recorder covers a large amount of money, we on the recommendation of the Recorder, would suggest that a Corporate Bond of \$1000.00 for each of the above officers be provided at the expense of the Temple.

MASONS URGE WORLD PEACE

WASHINGTON GRAND LODGE ADOPTS RESOLUTIONS.

The Masonic Fraternity Throughout the World is Urged to Support General Plan of Universal Disarmament. Copies Sent to Each Grand Lodge.

There has been received in this city a handsomely illuminated copy of a resolution that has been adopted by the grand lodge, A. F. & A. M. of Washington at its last annual meeting which marks the beginning of a movement that promises to become world wide. The resolution reads as follows:

"Whereas, By the exercise of brother love, we are taught to regard the whole human species as one family, who, as created by our Almighty parent, are to aid and support each other;

"And, Whereas, The application of that principle in the relation of nations to each other is but the extension of the field of its operation from individuals to groups of individuals;

"And, Whereas, The representatives of the several groups of individuals comprising the principal nations of the world are about to assemble a second time in a peace conference at The Hague, for the avowed purpose of promoting the welfare of society;

"And, Whereas, Some of the governments there to be represented are earnestly seeking to relieve the peoples of the world of the horrors of war and of the burden of maintaining armies and navies, by the disarmament of nations, and are advocating the discussion and consideration, at this and future peace conferences, of a plan for eventual disarmament; now, therefore, be it

"Resolved, By the grand lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of Washington, in annual communication assembled, that the Masonic Fraternity throughout the world, individually and through its several grand bodies, are urged to support the general plan of eventual disarmament of nations by assisting other moral forces in crystallizing in the minds of our fellowmen the principle of universal peace which is but a corollary of the principle of the Brotherhood of Man, to the end that our children's children may realize the blessings of that divine message, 'On earth peace, god will toward men.'

"And, be it further resolved, That a copy of this resolution be transmitted by special communication from the grand secretary's office to each grand lodge of Free and Accepted Masons throughout the world."

No Attempt to Interfere.

The circular letter accompanying this resolution sets forth that "by its adoption and transmission it is not intended that the Masonic Fraternity through its grand bodies shall in promoting the object of the resolution attempt to interfere with the functions of government or suggest a surrender of any of the prerogatives or rulers in whose domain they severally reside. But it is intended that the spirit of the resolution may be brought to the attention of the brethren through the several grand lodges and it is hoped that the resolution will, with other moral forces directed to the same end, so actively exert its influence in the support of the principal involved, that the conscience and reason of men will be awakened to a realization of the error of war and be inspired with a controlling desire for universal peace. If the resolution, even in an infinitesimal degree assist in that awakening, it will have fully accomplished its purposes."

A Domain of "Politics."

"The grand lodge of Washington by adoption of these resolutions has proven that there is a domain of 'politics' in which all good men can agree," said a gentleman yesterday who is an authority on things Masonic. "It has proven that the firm and certain voice of Masonry can be heard declaring for right without arousing dissent or discord. The Masons of Washington, believing that human brotherhood is more than a mere platitude, would have men live together, then in peace. That the sentiment may have force, they appeal to Masons everywhere to join in its expression."

"Over the seas, where militarism is a real burden, where the nations in arms jealously guard their frontiers, there will be responses to this appeal. It is not anti-militarism, that is proposed to alarm the patriotism of those on guard but a movement to which all may agree without fear of loss, and if responses should come from the grand orient and grand lodge of France, from the grand lodge Alpha, from the Grand Lodges of Germany and from the Grand Orients of Italy, Spain and Belgium, what will be the attitude of our strict exclusionists? Will they get from the plinths through which they have viewed masonry and the world of ideas long enough to correct and enlarge their visions and to be just and sensible for once? Or will they, like Plato's men in the cave, persist in the mistaking shadows for realities? On any event the grand lodge of Washington has done perhaps more than it intended and better in thus bringing pretension of altruism to a practical test."

WILL PROSECUTE LODGE GRAFTERS

MASONIC ORDER TAKING STEPS
TO STOP GROWING EVIL.

Association Has Been Formed to Prevent Grafters From Getting Aid From Unsuspecting Members of the Order—Each Lodge Will Have "Rogues' Gallery."

Readers of The Gazette will remember that a few weeks ago a Masonic fraud was discovered at work in this city, and was very neatly exposed. He was arrested and jailed and his pedigree made known at least in this section of Iowa, so that he is not likely to operate in lodges or among the members of the fraternity hereabouts for some time. It was possible to bring about this exposure by the very careful records that are kept at the Iowa Masonic library, and an inquiry brings to light the fact that the Masonic fraternity has an organization extending throughout the United States and Canada devoted to the purpose of discovering, exposing and punishing any such frauds or impostors.

A very few years ago this working upon the charity of the brethren was a fruitful field for the indolent and worthless men who had at some time in the past been members and for their shortcomings had been expelled, but retained their knowledge of the craft and used it as an easy means of grafting. Others again, through underhanded methods, had secured sufficient knowledge to impose upon the unwary or inexperienced Masons of the places they visited, and in this way reaped a harvest. So numerous had these become that they constituted a real bureau upon the Masons of the country and the evil showed itself in that men were suspicious even of deserving cases.

A Relief Association.

To set this right there was formed what is known as the Masonic Relief Association of the United States and Canada. This organization, which has its headquarters in Toronto, is informed from all points of the appearance of any such grafter as the one that appeared here a short time ago. Whenever possible a photograph is obtained. This is reproduced, together with a full description of the grafter, and monthly circulars are issued to all the lodges who are members of the association. The method adopted is generally for grand lodges to subscribe the necessary sum and the amount is made up by each lodge in its jurisdiction, and in return each of these receives the circulars, regular and special, and all other matter sent out for the purpose of detecting frauds. These are, or should be, kept on file in each lodge room and any person under suspicion can thus be readily identified. At the Masonic library where such matters are reduced to a system every man's name is indexed, together with his aliases, so that upon occasion an inquiry may be answered at once as to whether the suspected party has appeared before anywhere through the country. By this means, and also by the almost unanimous rule obtaining now of telegraphing to the lodge of which a man says he is a member and the securing of a statement as to his standing, the Masonic frauds have a hard row to travel and are not in receipt of very great rewards for their imposture.

During the present month this relief association will meet in convention at Louisville, Ky., to discuss plans for enlarging its scope during the coming year. The very great benefit to be derived from a membership in the association has become apparent, and almost all of the governing bodies of the order in the United States and the Dominion of Canada are now associated. It goes without saying that with the experience gained more accurate methods will be adopted to discourage all Masonic tramps and to systematize the giving of Masonic charity so that those who are deserving will meet with friendly assistance whenever needed and those who are willing to spend twice as much energy in grafting than they do in securing useful and honest employment will be obliged to seek other means of getting a living without work.

ANAMOSA MASONS TAKE CEDAR RAPIDS BY STORM

Greatest Meeting in History of Order
Locally Was Held Last Evening,
by Crescent Lodge.

A bright, clean new leaf in the history of Masonry in Cedar Rapids was turned over and filled to overflowing with permanent records last night when the beautiful and impressive work of the third degree was conferred in Crescent lodge No. 25 upon William Bergstresser by the officers and staff of Anamosa lodge, George L. Schoonover, worshipful master.

Worshipful Master Filip of Crescent lodge had sent out the "tip" to other lodges in this vicinity that there would be something doing out of the ordinary last night, with the result that the capacity of the banquet room was taxed at supper, and when work was resumed in the evening every available inch of space in the large lodge room was filled. "The perennial story as to the oldest Mason in Iowa has come up again and is going the rounds of the state papers, with almost every paper having its candidate," said Jos. E. Morcombe yesterday. "Some of them have even gone so far as to say that this or that man was the first made a member of the fraternity in Iowa. It may be a matter of interest to know that the man who first received the degrees of Masonry in the then territory of Iowa was James D. Hartsock. This was during the winter of 1840 and the ceremony occurred in what was then Burlington lodge No. 1, now Des Moines lodge No. 1 on the lists of the grand lodge of Iowa. Mr. Hartsock was afterward, and until the time of his death, a resident of Iowa City, where he was at one time mayor and also postmaster. He also achieved to the honor of grand master of Iowa Masons.

"In this connection it may also be stated that T. S. Parvin upon the occasion of Mr. Hartsock receiving his third degree, acted as master, and which was the first time in his life that he conferred the Master Mason's degree."

There will be a special business meeting and ceremonial session of El Kahir temple, Nobles of the Mystic Shrine, Wednesday evening, September 11, at which time a final vote will be taken on the new temple proposition, which has been approved by all the other Masonic bodies. LONG IN SERVICE AS A CRAFTSMAN

JACOB SPRINGER HAS NOTABLE
MASONIC CAREER.

Planted Fraternity in Benton County—
Was Frequent Visitor in Early
Years in This City.

Probably no man in this section of the state feels the same interest in Masonry as does the Hon. Jacob Springer of St. Clair township, this county. For over sixty years he has been an adherent and a member of that order. He was made an entered apprentice in Fayette lodge in western Pennsylvania, December, 1846, nearly sixty-one years ago. He took the "fellow-craft" and "master Mason" the following month.

In the early fifties he came west and settled in Benton county in St. Clair township. He had but few neighbors until about the end of the war, when the township settled up. However, he brought his Masonry with him and he cast about to establish a lodge. His first step was to organize a lodge in his own township as there were no towns nearer to him than Marengo on the south and Cedar Rapids on the east. For this purpose he and others secured a charter April 7, 1862, and organized what is known as St. Clair lodge which is located at Norway, this county. This lodge was organized under the dispensation granted at the time stated and its first officials were: James McQuinn, W. M.; C. G. Turner, S. W.; S. H. Springer, J. W.; T. H. Springer, secretary; W. Alspach, treasurer; Jacob Springer, S. D.; S. W. Stocker, J. D. The charter was granted June 3, 1863, and the same officers were re-elected.

Lodge Organized in His Home.

The first meeting of this lodge, while under the dispensation, was held in an upper room of Mr. Springer's farm house. His brother, S. H. Springer, was at that time building a new house and arrangements with him to fit up the upper story for a lodge room, which was done and the meetings were held there until the removal to Norway.

Mr. Springer was made a Royal Arch Mason in Vinton January 5, 1868, and was a charter member of the Royal Arch chapter of Belle Plaine. He was made a Knight Templar in Clinton in 1868. He was a charter member of the Knights Templar when it was established in Belle Plaine. He took the degrees in the Consistory at Lynco, Iowa, in 1878. He was elected K. C. C. H. by the grand council at Washington, D. C., May 5, 1897.

This is a brief history of one of the oldest, most faithful and consistent Masons in Iowa. It is no small honor to be a member of so prominent an order as the Masonic for over 60 years. He is acquainted with many prominent members of the order throughout the state and it is always a great pleasure to him to mingle with his fellow members in the various branches of the order to which he belongs.

SHRINERS ISSUE NOTICE.

For Big Ceremonial Session Here, December 11.

Official notice of a big ceremonial session of El Kahir temple, Nobles of the Mystic Shrine, for December 11, was issued today. This will be the twenty-first annual session, and the ceremonial doings will be held in C. S. P. S. hall. The Nobles will be particularly favored by the presence of Frank C. Roundy, imperial potentate of North America. Ed. I. Alderman, deputy imperial potentate, who is camping out temporarily at Lincoln, but whose lodge home is in Cedar Rapids, will also be present in large bulk. The business session will be held at 2 p. m., the ceremonial session at 7:30 p. m., and the banquet at the Montrose will begin some time and end shortly before daylight. The anniversary of the founding of the temple will be observed in due form, and Potentate Haskell is making extensive arrangements therefor.

MUSCATINE HAS A CANDIDATE

In Contest for Claim of Oldest Mason in Iowa.

"Every town in Iowa having a Masonic lodge, and that lodge a gray-headed member, seems to have rushed into print of late as having the oldest Mason in the state," says Jos. E. Morcombe, who as historian of the grand lodge of Iowa has very intimate knowledge of the affairs of that fraternity in this state. "The Gazette" a few days ago spoke of the claims of Jacob Springer of Benton county. Mr. Springer having become a member in his home state in 1847. But it may be said, beyond all controversy, that Muscatine can claim the honor in this case. Early in 1846 a Masonic lodge was organized in that city, under authority of the grand lodge of Missouri. It was the second in the then territory of Iowa, that at Burlington only preceding it by a very few months. Muscatine, or Bloomington as it was then called, had a group of Masons from other states more than usually well informed, and these made the new lodge a real center of Masonic light and influence. General Ansel Humphrey, the second grand master of Iowa, was its first master; and this state has had few Masons his equal. The influence of these men drew into the lodge the young business and professional men of the frontier town. And among those of the first few years was J. Scott Richman. Mr. Richman, as the records of the library show, was born in Ohio March 11, 1820. He was already prominent as a lawyer when he, in October, 1846, was made a Mason in old No. 2 of Muscatine. This was in the year following organization of the grand lodge of Iowa, and Mr. Richman's Masonic history is therefore parallel to the official record of the craft in the state. The other contestants for the honor will try in vain to show an equal length of years with this honored veteran of Muscatine."
